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## From the Principal

I am pleased to report a very smooth and positive start to the year at Bankstown Senior College. Most new students have satisfactorily completed their probationary period and have now settled into their studies. We have closed our enrolments in Year 11, due to the large number of new students enrolling in Stage 6 for 2019. It has been very satisfying to see the majority of students involved in whole College activities, including Harmony Day and Team Building Day. Students gain great benefit from these days as they help to build a sense of community and connectedness in the College.

To further achieve this aim, the College has implemented Mentor classes twice a week. These groups contain ten to thirteen students and provide the staff with an opportunity to closely monitor

student attendance and to help students with issues as they arise. The students build connectedness to other members of the College community, as they work through the various activities appropriate for each year group.

I very much enjoyed meeting so many parents at our first Parent Focus group meeting this term. The group meets once a term and I really appreciate their thoughts and input into their children's education. Parents of new students are always welcome. Please contact our Community Liaison Officer, Ms Qudsia Rahimi, if you wish to attend the meeting.

I would like to thank all the College staff (teaching and non-teaching) for their hard work in Term 1. It is what teachers know, do and care about that contributes to improved student learning outcomes.

2019 promises to be another year of ongoing learning at Bankstown Senior College. To all of our returning students, welcome back and I wish you continued success in your educational endeavours. To our new enrolments, welcome to the college and I hope your journey with us is a successful one.

There is much to be done this year in the area of HSC Minimum Standards. All of our Year 10 students will be attempting the Minimum Standards tests in Reading, Writing and Numeracy and will hopefully achieve the required level by the end of the year. This will mean that they will receive an HSC when they complete Year 12 in two years' time. Year 10 students will have two opportunities to attempt these tests this year and students are strongly encouraged to take advantage of the Literacy and Numeracy Support periods to develop their skills in these areas. The WordFlyers program will provide students with even greater support in their development of reading and writing skills. Some students in Year 11 will also be required to achieve the appropriate levels in the Minimum Standards tests and will also be attempting them this year as well.

Year 12 students will be completing their half yearly exams this term. The most important purpose of these exams is for students to develop their exam techniques as the countdown to the HSC exams grows ever closer. All Year 12 students are encouraged to develop study plans that are workable and effective so that valuable preparation time is used to their advantage. It is during the study time that students will improve their understanding of their courses so that they are thoroughly prepared for their exams and assessments. As the Deputy Principal associated with Year 12 this year, I would like to encourage all students to make the most of all the support that is available to them by the College so that they can achieve their personal best this year. The Elevate program also provided Year 12 students with a great deal of advice in the area of exam preparation and study, and now is the time for its implementation.

Silver and Gold awards have already been achieved this year by a number of very hard working students, and I hope even more students are able to share in this achievement by the end of the year. Receiving these awards shows commitment, effort, perseverance and pride in learning.

### **English/EALD Report**

The year has started well for students studying English at BSC. Year 12 students are half way through their HSC year and are about to start their Half Yearly exams. Students need to remember that their results will only reflect the effort they are prepared to put in. They must work on suggestions and feedback given to them by their teachers.

Year 11 Advanced, Standard, EAL/D (English as an Additional Language/Dialect) and English Studies students have commenced their study. This year we are fortunate to have a new staff member, Ms Sheng to take one of the new EAL/D classes. Students have completed an assessment task and once it is marked must look carefully at the feedback from their teachers, in order to improve. Some students have not as yet achieved the HSC Minimum Standards in Reading and Writing from last year. These students will have two opportunities this year to attempt these tests. Students must take every opportunity to improve their reading and writing.

Year 10 is working through a new program, which will better meet the literacy needs of our students. This, along with a continuation of the "Wordflyers" computer program, will be of great assistance in readiness for the online literacy tests in Reading and Writing that the students will face later in the year.

EFS has begun the year with lots of productive learning happening in all classes under the excellent leadership of Mr Thai. We are also fortunate to have two new teachers, Ms Ang and Ms Nordstrom join the English/EAL/D staff teaching the EFS classes. We warmly welcome all our new staff.

# Mercy Connect celebrates a ten year commitment in supporting BSC students

Since 2010, our College through the Refugee Transition Program (RTP) has been fortunate to offer academic and welfare support to our students of refugee and asylum seeker backgrounds through Mercy Works – Sisters of Mercy in Australia & Papua New Guinea. This worthwhile initiative holds the Mercy Connect program which invites, recruits, trains and supports former teachers and professionals of various fields and industries to volunteer their high level of expertise and lengthy experience to support students as they settle into primary and secondary schools in both the private and public education systems. The volunteer tutors provide support that nurtures well-being and self-esteem and improves students' literacy and numeracy skills.

In 2018 the Mercy Connect program in Sydney had more than 70 volunteers and operated in 38 primary and secondary schools and campuses assisting more than 750 students each year. We are grateful to this program for increasing the number of tutors at our College from year to year reaching a peak of seven tutors in 2016. In 2019, we have the pleasure and benefit of the support from four highly committed tutors: Ms Chris Jinga, , Dr Allen Conduit, Ms Bronlyn Schoer and a new member, Lorraine Manning. The tutors show incredible commitment, patience and flexibility to sincerely support our needy students with their school work, offer advice about study habits and simply provide emotional and mental support and stability. We thank them wholeheartedly for stretching their good will to fulfil our students' needs. Please approach them when they are available in the library

to help you with your school work. They are very keen to meet you. We thank the executive staff of this incredible program Paul Taylor, the Co-ordinator and Jennie Ryan, the Manager and their professional staff for the amazing direction and support for Ms Brunet and Ms Pascalis who constantly liaise with them to operate this program in the most effective way in our College.

### Here is the report from Hsu HTET (Year 11):

I am really grateful that I got a chance to attend the Young Humanitarians Conference. That was absolutely awesome!

There were 7 workshops in this conference and I tried three of them. In 'Speed Mentoring', I got the chance to talk with and learn from people of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander backgrounds, community development workers and people with refugee experiences. I had meaningful conversations in the areas of arts, culture, education, well-being, the legal system and employment. 'Taboo Talk' is really interesting and I loved it the most. We were able to talk about uncomfortable and difficult topics with a full and open mind and no one would judge us. I loved it so much and I chose to be a volunteer for 'Taboo Talk'. The last workshop I tried was the 'Art of Public Speaking'. I learned how to speak in public using my voice, body and motion and how to get the message across through persuasion, presentation and how to release our stress caused by the presentation. And we did weird dance moves too!

Listening to Isaiah Dawe's inspiring speech about his life and his determination in life made me a lot stronger and braver than I was.

"Never give up!"

"Find your role model!"

"Know it's possible!"

Face and embrace your fears!" His mottos were totally inspirational.

The dance performances were so enjoyable and amazing. When talking about this conference, I can't forget about the food too. It was so delicious. We also got a chance to ask whatever we want to some politicians: Jenny Leong (MP for Newtown) and Jihad Dib (MP for Lakemba, the first Muslim man to sit in the NSW Parliament).

### Life is unpredictable when chasing a wave Past the Shallows

Living on a remote, mysterious island like Tassie, loving to surf yet frightened of the deep, dark ocean, the young Australian novelist Favel Parrett finds it an inspiration for her intriguing first novel, *Past the Shallows*.

Favel Parrett's debut novel, *Past the Shallows* published by Hachette Australia was the winner of the newcomer of the year, Australian Book Industry and the Dobbie Encouragement Awards in 2012.

Parrett captivates all with her warm humility, her humble intelligence, her bright smile and her talentedliterary works. The HSC English courses invite her intriguing novel as a new, fresh prescribed text into the classrooms as students explore the module, Texts and Human Experience. Past the Shallows was an obvious winner for the staff of Bankstown Senior College, Ms Ginis, Ms Pascalis, Ms Kormondi and Mr Hicks who chose it and appreciated its simplicity yet meaningful narrative expression, its complex intriguing plot, its authentic characters and its great wild Aussie ocean setting which is important for the native students to read and relate to in Standard English and for the CALD students of the EALD course to learn more about the Aussie landscape and culture. Set in the south east of Tasmania, the ocean becomes the powerful and ferocious character which reflects the violent character of Dad. He is the abnormal father figure of a dysfunctional family of three sons. The sons, Harry, Miles and Joe draw the sympathy of the readers and they hold a strong brotherhood through their many challenging moments in their young lives as they struggle with the absence of their mother and the abusive behavior of their dad. The mother death in a car accident is a mystery which travels through the plot as a secret for both the characters and the readers who try to discover it. Parrett expresses in person how "a secret can destroy a person and a family".



BSC was most fortunate recently as Parrett kindly accepted to fly in from Victoria to visit the College on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> March and offer a presentation which truly engaged the students even further into her novel. The students were fascinated by her "show

and tell" session of three items that she circulated including the seahorse, the shark egg pouch and the abalone shell which are strong sea symbols in her story. We discovered more about this 44 year old, fair skinned, talented, red head as the audience were fascinated by her background of surfing, travelling in Africa and caring for animals in her regular volunteer efforts.



Dean Ross, one of the English Standard students chose to read an extract from the novel which showed the genuine relationship between George and Harry. As a reader, he is drawn to this connection because it is fully developed and reminds him of his personal connection with his grandfather during a similar fishing experience to Harry and George.

Parrett speaks lovingly about her beautiful birthplace of Tasmania on the 18th May 1974 where she spent years of her childhood and the settings make their way into her novel particularly the home of the disfigured character of George. Parrett moved off the island to Victoria with her family but she repeatedly tells how the sweet memories of her birthplace stay in her heart like a beautiful image. Mahmood, a student from the EALD course forms a connection at this point, as he expresses "Most of us refugees can also relate to this as we have fled and left the place where we spent all our childhood years".

Marwah and Karmeen read significant parts of the novel with passion which were heart felt moments for Parrett. The presentation was an incredible experience for many who had never met the author of a book, had their copy signed and enjoyed a quick photo as well as a very sincere Instagram text from Parrett.

One of the best days of my writing life – talking to bright, amazing and passionate asylum seekers and refugee students at Bankstown Senior College. These students are studying PTS in a language which is not their first language and they are doing an incredible job. I was moved to tears many times today when students talked about what they loved about my book. I'm telling you – there was enough love in the room to light up the whole of Sydney. Thank you to the amazing teachers and students of Bankstown Senior College. My heart is full.

As students left the presentation, it was evident that the feelings were mutual. Students embraced Parrett by promising to go home to read the whole novel (if they had not done so already) and those who were introduced to it for the first time borrowed copies for bedtime reading. We look forward to Parrett's return with the next cohort of students who have already felt the positive vibes from her original visit.

### Chasing the Light in the Ocean



Living in a remote isolated land, loving to surf while frightened by the deep dark ocean, the debut novelist, Favel Parrett now finds it an inspiration, writes MEHIDI HUSSAINI.

Favel Parrett is an Australian author. She is from Czech. She was born in Tasmania; the land that is golden and crisp, with an almost violet sky. The shore to the Indian Ocean holds a breeze with a cold wind of Antarctica.

She was a surfer, a postman girl and a DJ. She explored different jobs until her brother inspired her to follow her dream as a writer.

It was not long after the TAFF writing course that she started writing *Past the Shallows*. She has reflected the teenage voices of three brothers especially the engaging and vulnerable younger brother, Harry. The prose indicates the brusque family situation after their mother's mysterious loss on a very isolated harsh environment.

The novel reveals many human experiences such as loss, friendship, despair, tragedy, families and the challenges to communicate with the important people in one's life.

In the beginning, I thought Dad has this isolated way of life because he lost his wife but then I realized that the behaviour of Dad has been outraged by a mysterious relationship which mum had with another man.

The book is a moving tragedy reciting social and human experience to engage the readers in an eventful manner. "So real, so true this novel sweeps you away in its tide." said Robert Drewe.

Socially and culturally, the novel sets itself on the small, coastal settlement where the main work is a fishing industry and especially abalone harvesting. In this novel, the Ocean is representing a character. "I am in love with the Southern Ocean," the author said. Past the shallows is a story of the bond of brotherhood and the fragility of youth. The loss of a loved one and the anomaly of surrounding relatives. Its unique mystery made this novel most appealing for BSC students and staff.

We were told that members of the parliament meet in the chambers to debate bills (proposed laws) and represent the people from their electorate or state. The house of the representatives is the lower house of the bicameral parliament of Australia, the upper house being the senate. Red colour is used for the senate and green for the house of the representatives. Green colour is used for the house of representatives due to green dye traditionally being cheaper. TV camera and microphones are used to broadcast proceedings. In 1925 there was only one woman elected in the house. There are ten female representatives out of 42 in the chamber which is about 23%.

At 11:30, two female members of the parliament gave a speech encouraging us that society need more female leaders. She told us to take space because that is what men did. It finished at 2:30. It was such an incredible moment in parliament.
