### From the Principal

As we enter Term 3, I would like to say how pleased I am at the number of students who are continuing to attend the college every day, despite the trying times in which we are living. Almost all students have returned refreshed for a very important term of learning, especially for our Year 12 cohort. We have also welcomed a new preparation class, most of whom are recent graduates from our Intensive English Centre.

HSC students and Year 11 students have recently received Semester 1 reports, and Year 10 and EFS will be receiving their reports in the next two weeks. Although there will be no formal Parent Teacher evening this year, due to COVID restrictions, parents are more than welcome to contact the college by phone or email and talk to teachers about their child's progress.

I would like to reassure you that Bankstown Senior College is following all Department of Education protocols regarding COVID restrictions. Every classroom is provided with hand sanitiser and disinfectant and students are expected to clean their desks and hand sanitise at the beginning of each lesson.

Students are constantly reminded (and encouraged) to remain at least 1.5 metres from each other in the quadrangle at recess and lunchtime. The cafeteria is only for takeaway purchases. Finish times have been staggered to minimise disruption and overcrowding at the bus stop after school and all staff have had training infection control protocols. Although we cannot control practices in the wider community, in our College community, we are doing everything we can to keep students and staff safe in these unprecedented times.

#### From the Deputy Principals

#### **Deputy Principal: Jenni Gardiner**

It was great to welcome all students back to the College for face-to-face learning in Term 2. Our students should be commended for the way they have adapted to the new Covid-safe protocols such as sanitising hands, disinfecting desks and following physical distancing guidelines. Please remember not to send students to school if they are unwell, even if they have mild symptoms.

We understand the disruption to learning during Term 1 has made some students feel anxious about their assessments and exams so we have provided extra learning support, particularly for Year 12 students. The Department of Education's <u>learning from home</u> hub has links to educational resources to support students learning from home for all stages of learning and Year 12 students can visit the <u>HSC hub</u> which contains high -quality, on-demand resources to help them prepare for their exams.

BSC teachers are very busy developing their knowledge and skills in order to best teach and support student learning. We understand that staff professional learning is vital for successful student learning so the staff have undertaken professional learning and training in problem-solving and strategic planning, along with "What Works Best" - effective practices to support school improvement and enhance the learning outcomes of our students. Teachers have also spent time reviewing the NSW curriculum reforms which should give teachers more time to concentrate on deep learning by reducing the hours teachers spend on non-essential learning and compliance requirements and better prepare Year 11 and 12 students for future work and study with new learning areas and career pathways.

Term 2 has indeed been very different for the students and staff of Bankstown Senior College. Despite the challenges of the Covid-19 virus, students and teachers have worked hard to ensure that teaching and learning has continued to occur in the best possible way. We all experienced remote learning and realised very quickly how important it is for us to learn together, face to face. Many students and teachers also learnt very quickly that Google Classroom is a very important way of communicating and learning in the absence of the actual classroom, and we also realised very quickly that this type of learning can be quite frustrating in the absence of adequate technology and internet access. We certainly learnt a lot this term!

Many additional educational events and activities which would normally have taken place in Term 2

have been cancelled or postponed due to Covid-19 restrictions. We have been unable to conduct assemblies or excursions, but as restrictions are lifted over the next few months, we will return to these events. Staff are constantly undertaking online professional learning on ways to improve learning and teaching in the areas of literacy, numeracy, technology and assessment, which will promote effective and improved teaching and learning processes.

Bankstown Senior College maintains its commitment to helping students in Year 10, Year 11 and 12 meet the minimum standard in literacy and numeracy. So far, the majority of Year 10 students were successful in achieving the minimum standard in reading and are in the process of completing the numeracy and writing tests. We will continue to give our students more opportunities to achieve the minimum standard throughout the year.

I would like to also acknowledge the tireless work done by the BSC and IEC Transition Teams which meet regularly to discuss and support the transition of students from the IEC to the College. Many students have expressed their gratitude for having a team of people who help make their transition into "high school" a smooth and comfortable Congratulations to the graduating EFS and IEC students this semester. I am looking forward to getting to know our new Preparation and EFS class which will be starting next term. Congratulations too, to the many students who achieved Gold and Silver certificates this term through their hard work, determination and citizenship qualities. This is an outstanding achievement in one term.

I wish everyone a safe and restful holiday and hope Year 12 students make the most of this coming break before their Trials begin next term.

#### **Bon Appétit! Year 12 French Excursion 2019**

At the end of last year, Year 12 French Beginners students went on an excursion to the Alliance Française and French restaurant 'The Little Snail' with Madame Maguire and Madame Brunet. We are very proud of BSC's Friends of Zainab scholarship recipients. At the end of term 4, 2019, The Public Education Foundation proudly presented a vast array of scholarships to worthy students in the public school system. Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 social distancing conditions, a special ceremony at the majestic Sydney Town Hall which traditionally takes place in May had to be cancelled. This is a very prestigious event with inspiring speeches and entertaining and highly talented performers which makes this night most memorable.

However, the necessity of online learning due to the virus has enabled all applicants of the scholarship to be winners and receive necessary support. #### Refugee Week 2020 - WELCOME

The Refugee Council of Australia has declared 2020 the "Year Of Welcome." Every year Bankstown Senior acknowledges and celebrates College contributions made by refugees and asylum seekers to the Australian society, at the Term 2 assembly and with various activities. This year, due to COVID-19, we celebrated in a different way: during LMN students learnt the difference between the terms "migrant, asylum seeker, refugee and internal displaced people" and answered questions in a PowerPoint Presentation. Students were shocked to learn about the staggering statistics linked to this global issue. The students in the two photography classes helped acknowledging the theme "Welcome" by taking photos. Others made a video clip with interviews of students about what the word "Welcome" means to them. Students watched the video during LMN and Year 12 students watched a short clip that Favel Parrett sent us about the same theme. Parrett, the author of "Past the shallows" (a book studied for HSC English) was very grateful of having the opportunity to share her ideas on this year's theme for Refugee Week.







Refugee Week 2020 also has a sub-theme: "Share a meal, Share a story". The health restrictions we must follow due to COVID do not allow us to share a meal,

but two Year 12 students have generously donated their time and cooking skills to share two recipes by recording themselves cooking these recipes from Afghanistan and Somalia. These videos were watched during LMN and both students and staff were amazed by these students' culinary abilities.

Moreover, thanks to our Community Liaison Officer, Ms Rahimi, we have started a new initiative: "share a recipe from your country". Before the end of the year, all the recipes shared by students and staff will be collated in a special BSC College Cookbook. We would like to thank the SRC members who went to the different classes during LMN to explain to the students about this initiative.
